



Lisbon Monitoring Platform


- Platform to monitor progress on Lisbon agenda at regional and local level
- NEW: 100 regions and cities involved – 2nd call for expression of interest in March
- Clustering of regions according to development patterns
- Evaluate involvement of regions in national planning
- assess the synergy between the Lisbon agenda and Cohesion Policy
- interactive web platform








- Lisbon: mostly identified with investment in knowledge and innovation
- LRAs actively contributing towards implementation of IGs but lack of formal planning in NRPs - Disconnection was highest in innovation
- Cohesion Policy considered essential or very important in the funding of Lisbon-related actions and projects



Disconnection with Lisbon Governance process but implementation going ahead





- Preparation of the report to the Spring European Council 2008
- Series of workshops focusing on the 4 specific areas for priority action in Presidency Conclusions – 23/24 March 2006
- Workshop on 'Investment in Knowledge and Innovation' will take place in June
- Sub-themes of first workshop: ecoinnovation, innovation clusters and indicators

 Regions for Economic Change: important initiative to facilitate the exchange of good practices in innovative regional policy

 10 members of the Lisbon Monitoring Platform presented their projects, experiences and lessons learnt during a Roundtable



- Innovation: key element of the revised Lisbon Strategy, but balance between 3 pillars essential
- Regions: well positioned to appreciate needs and construct policies by encouraging relevant actors to interact and concentrate on shared interests
- Important to go beyond exchange of information and showcasing of best practices
- Role and responsibilities of regions increasing
